



OVERVIEW

The Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) funded by the Government of Jamaica with a loan from the World Bank and implemented by the Jamaica Social Investment Fund aims to improve market access for micro and small rural agricultural producers and tourism product and service providers.

Leveraging partnerships and relationships with key community stakeholders, REDI is well on its way to investing USD\$15 million for the development of innovative solutions for economic development to include:

- Protected agriculture
- Drip irrigation technology
- Water harvesting & storage
- Cold chain supply & post-harvest facilities
- Agro processing
- Livestock production
- Community tourism
- Capacity building & training

Through the Jamaica Community Experiences brand, the ongoing diversification and development of the local tourism product to incorporate community tourism experiences, including tours and attractions in the UNESCO World Heritage site the Blue and John Crow Mountains offers exciting possibilities for partnerships and unique experiences. AGRICULTURE

GREENHOUSE PRODUCTION AND **WATER HARVESTING**

The Jamaica Social Investment Fund and the Jamaica Bauxite Institute Water Harvesting and Greenhouse Cluster project valued at over JMD\$160 million is part of the drive to develop a vibrant and economically sustainable agriculture sector. Aiming to increase and improve agricultural productivity through the introduction of greenhouse technology supported by enhanced market linkages. With enhanced water harvesting and storage facilities the greenhouses are able to support year round production.

Through an earlier investment, REDI also established greenhouses at 12 other locations in the parishes of Trelawny, Manchester, St Elizabeth, Westmoreland, St Mary, St Thomas and Clarendon and provided employment for an additional 62 persons. Some 622,080 high quality disease free seedlings, including 20,000 citrus seedlings are being produced annually by the farmers under the project to boost both open field and greenhouse production.

DRIP IRRIGATION TECHNOLOGY AND WATER STORAGE

With the thrust to develop an agricultural sector resilient to climate change aimed at improving productivity and increasing the consistency of production, REDI has partnered with multiple stakeholders to introduce drip irrigation technology and water storage for over 1,000 farmers operating on over 254 hectares of farmlands which will translate in at least 60% higher production capacity as shown in the production numbers from RADA. This will positively impact on the production of watermelon, tomato, sweet pepper, broccoli, thyme, cauliflower, red cabbage, ginger, lettuce, peanuts, onion, cantaloupe, escallion, honeydew, pumpkin and hot pepper within these communities as well as the Agro Parks.

AGRO-PROCESSING FACILITIES

Jamaica has an abundance of great fruits and vegetables which farmers reap in bounteous quantities during the season. However, this seasonal availability and relatively low value does not make for a developed rural economy. Through investments in agro-processing facilities, REDI is giving life to the burgeoning food industry in Jamaica. Production and processing spaces being built by REDI has the potential to invigorate a high value food industry, where small scale producers are able to transform the bounty of the fields into an amazing array of products. From purpose built processing plants for cocoa and spices to logistics and packaging hubs for fresh produce, REDI is transforming the economic space for rural enterprises. In partnership with RADA, REDI has developed seven Incubator and Processing Facilities (IPF) across 7 seven parishes to provide community-based agro-processors with access to GAP (Good Agricultural Practices) certified facilities and equipment, training, product development and marketing support to improve their ability to enter new markets and improve their profitability.

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION

Jamaica's livestock industry exists within a highly competitive and protected international environment. Growing national demand for meat, coupled with higher international prices brought on by increases in grain prices and rising international demand have increased the profitability of producers who are now in production. Their production capacity however is well below the projected and present demand for meat. Against this background, current output and efficiencies in local meat production, especially in pig production and processing have been found to be well below required standards and investment needed by pork processors to increase the employment generated and future value added. It is estimated that Jamaica's farmers produce supplies only 60% of local pork consumed hence there is scope for further foreign exchange savings. Additionally the state of the art production facilities REDI has invested in can result in increased production allowing Jamaica to become a pork exporter, especially to CARICOM and other neighboring countries.

FOOD SAFETY INFRASTRUCTURE (HYGIENE STATIONS, CHEMICAL STORAGE AND PACKING FACILITIES)

In support of the national Food Safety Policy, JSIF has invested over \$76.8million in food safety infrastructure including hygiene stations, packing facilities and chemical storage. The objective is to contribute to Jamaica's efforts to become compliant with the U.S. Food & Drug Administration Food Safety Modernisation Act (USFDA FSMA) requirements and to ensure continued access of Jamaica's food to the United States, the country's leading export market. These food safety infrastructure are located in some of the major crop producing areas including three Agro Parks.

INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Throughout Jamaica, farmers and rural families depend on earnings from their small-scale farms to make a living and though their capacity has been improved through REDI, there is still a strong need for increased investment. These enterprises offer real potential, however the proprietors face steep challenges including obtaining adequate working capital, getting access to financial services, marketing support and storage for their goods. REDI is seeking multi-faceted solutions to provide the right blend of financial and non-financial services and products required to sustain the businesses. Economic and financial analyses on a sample of the projects show internal rates of return between 19 to 58 percent! A quick example can be shown with an investment in our greenhouse clusters, where the IRR is 27 percent.

REDI invites you to partner in innovating solutions. Some of the innovative approaches being explored include investments with partners that work to integrate activities across an entire value chain. This is critical as we seek to increase the returns on investments and sustain the local economies that depend on the income generated by the community. Value-chain investments strengthen the entire economic system which creates an interconnected environment for all members of the society.
